LENT

Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, comes on February 9, 2005. We Christians observe Lent for 40 days (excluding Sundays) to examine our spiritual condition and to strive to improve our relationship with God.

Lent is also a period of spiritual preparation for Easter Sunday, the greatest day on the Christian calendar.

During Lent SOTH offers Wednesday evening services at 7:00 pm. This year we will be studying the Lord's Prayer.

It's important that each Christian practice spiritual disciplines to "show that you a letter of Christ....written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts. (2 Corinthians 3:3)

After Ash Wednesday, we will gather for a simple soup supper each Wednesday from 5:30 to 6:30 pm, before the 7:00 pm Lenten Service. Freewill donation will be matched by Thrivent and will go toward the youth mission trip in 2005.

Your Lenten/Easter coin folders will be placed in your church mailbox prior to Ash Wednesday. Please return them on or prior to Good Friday.

Worship Foretaste

- February 6 *The Transfiguration of Our Lord* – The Christmas cycle that began in Advent comes to a conclusion with this festival. Jesus' divine glory is revealed and his place in salvation history becomes clear with the appearance of Moses and Elijah.
- February 9 *Ash Wednesday* – We begin the season of Lent on this day with services at 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. The theme for our Wednesday Lenten services will be "The Lord's Prayer."
- February 13 *The First Sunday in Lent* – The temptation of Jesus reminds us of the many temptations that come to us in our lives. Set within the context of Lent we can look to our baptism as a support in resisting those temptations that come our way.
- February 16 *Wednesday Lenten Service* – Soup suppers return prior to the mid-week service. We will use the Holden Evening Prayer each Wednesday during this season.
- February 20 *The Second Sunday in Lent* – Through the story of Jesus and Nicodemus our attention is turned toward the baptismal font where we are born again as God's children.
- February 23 *Wednesday Lenten Service*
- February 27 *The Third Sunday in Lent* – The gospel account of Jesus' encounter with a Samaritan woman opens eyes to the mercy, grace and forgiveness that is freely given to us. Pastor Jim Hytjan will be with us to preach. (see elsewhere in the newsletter for information on Pastor Hytjan)

The Shepherd's Voice



In mid-January the **Task Force for Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Studies on Sexuality** released its report and recommendations. The primary focus of this particular study was to look at the current practices of the ELCA regarding questions about homosexuality and the church's stance regarding the blessing of same-sex unions and the ordination of gay and lesbian people who are

in committed relationships.

The task force developed three recommendations, the first of which recognized the deep division that currently exists in our church concerning these questions. As such they developed an opening recommendation that "the ELCA [would] concentrate on finding ways to live together faithfully in the midst of our disagreements." This clearly acknowledges the diversity of opinions that are present and at the same time reminds us all that the church exists for the sake of the Gospel and that calls us to action in bringing that Gospel to all people.

The second recommendation turns to the issue of the blessing of same-sex unions. Here the task force directs the attention of the church to the guidance provided by the Conference of Bishops in 1993. At that time the conference made the following statement:

We, as the Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, recognize that there is basis neither in Scripture or tradition for the establishment of an official ceremony by this church for the blessing of a homosexual relationship.

This comment by the Conference of Bishops left the matter in the hands of local pastors and congregations.

The third, and final, recommendation of the task force addressed the ELCA documents, *Vision and Expectations*, which gives our perspective on appropriate conduct for rostered leaders, and *Definitions and Guidelines for Discipline*, which outlines the steps for discipline in situations where there is deviation from our standards. The report upholds our current policy of not ordaining individuals involved in an inappropriate relationship, this applies to heterosexual and homosexual individuals alike. Where it is suggesting a bit of a change is relative to the matter of discipline, stating, "as a pastoral response to the deep divisions among us, this church may choose to refrain from disciplining" congregations and individuals who are in conflict with the guidelines.

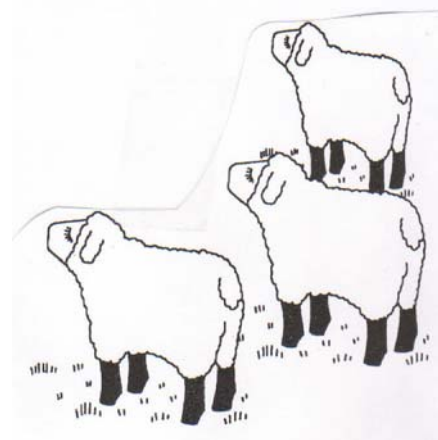
The full text of the report should be available at ELCA.org, the official website of our national church, by the time you receive this newsletter. The most important part of this process is in the fact that we, as a church, are able to talk and discuss with one another the difficult and potentially divisive issues of our day. This report makes it clear, to those who thought that the work of the task force was just "window dressing" for already decided positions, that the process of collecting information and perspectives from the wider church can influence the decisions that are made.

From here the report will be discussed by the Division for Ministry and the Division for Church in Society for their advice and counsel and then passed along to the ELCA Church Council. It is from the ELCA Church Council that formal proposals will be sent to the ELCA Churchwide Assembly for consideration. It may seem like a rather lengthy and convoluted process, but it is a process that ultimately works.

As we approach the season of Lent this can serve as a reminder to all of us that we are sinful people and we do not have the definitive answer to every question that comes along. Through prayer, study of Scripture and faithful conversation we can shed more light on ourselves, our understanding of the Gospel and our world.

Introducing our new Office Manager: Wendy Clark



We at Shepherd of the Hills have gotten used to seeing a bright smiling face in our church office. And things haven't changed with the addition of our new Office Manager, Wendy Clark, to the staff. When I met Wendy the first time, I knew instantly she would be a vivacious presence in our front office.

Wendy is one of those rare natives of Fort Collins, Colorado. In fact her mother, Fredie Van Cleave still lives in the house on North Taft Hill Road that Wendy's father—a rancher by trade—built her mother "in town" around the time Wendy was born. A country girl at heart, Wendy spent many of her formative years working on the family ranch. She and her husband John Clark—a long time employee of Woodward Governor—still spend time helping her brother on the 8000-acre Pawnee Ranch east of Fort Collins. Growing up she also spent time on a ranch on the Western Slope near Kremmling.

After graduating from High school, Wendy worked as a dental assistant for a few years before deciding to give-up the sterile environment for the grit and grime of construction—not a big surprise for a country girl. Wendy spent the next 20 plus years working in the construction industry, often as the sole female employee. In December 1979, wanting to experience something different, Wendy moved to California. She hired on with the people building a hotel and became the only woman in a crew of over a hundred men. She lived in California during the eighties, working on such notable projects as the Christa McAuliffe School in Oxnard, named after the teacher killed in the Space Shuttle Challenger.

In July 1990, Wendy returned home to Fort Collins where she worked for the Fort Collins Building and Zoning Department for six years and then worked for two roofing companies for the next seven years. And luckily for us, God decided Wendy should get out of construction.

A life-long Christian and member of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Wendy feels it is a privilege to work for the church. Additionally, having attended Thanksgiving services with us over the years, she has met several people from our church and looks forward to meeting and getting to know many more. Wendy is a mother and grandmother. Her daughter Carie, who also lives in Fort Collins, has two children, ages 11 and 14 months, and her son Christopher, who is deceased, has a five-year-old daughter living in Florida.

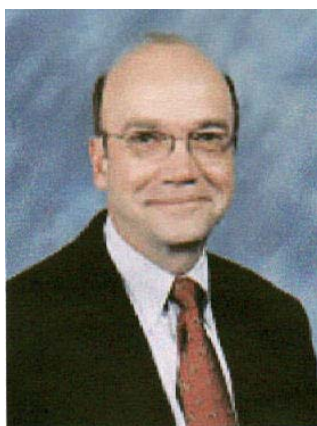

Tips from the Parish Nurses

If you live with chronic pain or stress, one treatment you may consider is massage. This hands-on treatment is finding increasing favor as a way to reduce chronic pain and stress and can aid in healing. The potential benefits are improving your circulation, releasing of stress reducing hormones such as endorphins and reducing pain which can promote healing and relaxation of muscles, and improved range of motion and increased flexibility. Some do's and don'ts — If you have a chronic illness or are pregnant, check with your doctor first, seek out an experienced professional, determine what technique you like. Be forthright about your preferences; remember massage isn't always advisable, for instance, if you have open sores, or severe varicose veins or phlebitis, and stop the massage if you are uncomfortable or it causes pain.



Lutheran Day at the Legislature—2005 Monday, February 21st

The 2004 election is behind us and, again, it is time for Lutherans around Colorado to learn more about our relationship with the Colorado State Legislature. Last February, some 170 of us gathered in Denver for an exciting, interesting day with our host, Bishop Bjornberg, and his relatively new legislative side-kick Terri McMasters, to learn what part ELCA Lutherans are playing in Colorado politics.

Basically, through Terri's Lutheran Advocacy Ministry, Colorado ELCA Lutherans cogitate, cooperate and coordinate efforts with several advocacy state organizations on "do-good" projects to benefit persons in CO who are disenfranchised for one reason or another. For example, we advocate for decent housing and for decent health care. Last year we tried—and failed—to get a bill passed which would have allowed Excel Energy to add a 25-cent fee to its monthly bill, which would have provided some \$17,000,000 for persons needing help with their home-heating costs. Both houses passed it. Governor Owens vetoed it. WHACK! And Terri just keeps coming back for more, God love her!

Last year was my first time there. Seven of us had a great day together. We came away smarter and cuter, if you can imagine that. And this year, we want you to join us. With a little luck, you could come home the same way. Here's what you need to know:

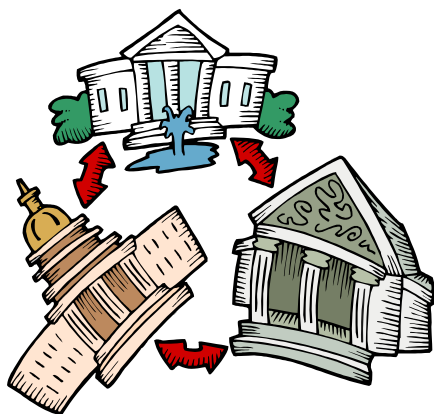

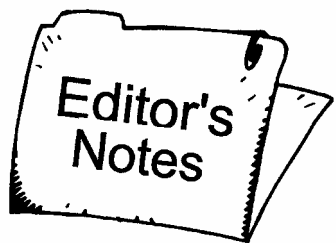

GIVE THE TREE – KEEP THE FRUIT



Yes, you really can make a charitable gift that keeps on paying you income for your lifetime. Now that the new year has arrived, it is a good time to review your will, insurance, investments, retirement funds, and your planned charitable giving. Depending on your circumstances, there are several ways to make gifts to your church. They range from the simple cash gift to continued income for yourself or tax savings for your heirs. Take a look at the following table and talk with your financial advisor for ways that you can participate. The table is a brief outline of some of the common planned giving devices.

PLANNED GIVING DEVICES

<u>Your Aim</u>	<u>The Gift</u>	<u>Your Benefits</u>
A simple gift.	Cash, securities, or personal property.	Income tax deduction, and no capital gains tax.
Make a gift that is revocable during your lifetime.	Name the Fund as a beneficiary of a living trust.	Control of the trust during your life: maybe some tax savings.
Defer a gift until after your lifetime.	Name the Fund in your will or as a beneficiary of insurance or retirement funds	Gift is exempt from Federal Estate Taxes.
Receive income from your gift for your lifetime.	Create a charitable gift annuity with the Fund and receive annual payments.	Current and future income tax savings, and fixed payments for your lifetime.
Reduce gift and estate taxes on assets passing to heirs.	Create a charitable lead trust that pay an income to the Fund for a fixed period, then passes to your heirs.	Reduce the size of your taxable estate, keep the property in the family, often with reduced taxes.

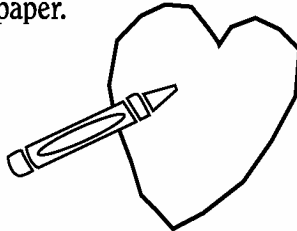
Send an Invisible Valentine to Someone You Love!

Here's what you'll need:

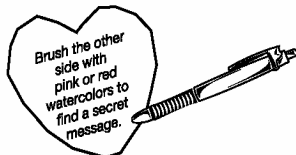
- Scissors

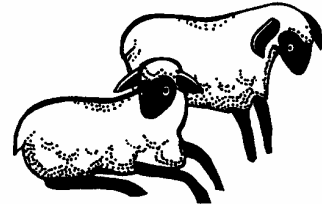
